Notes to Conference Participants:

The Council for the Development of Social Science Research in Africa (CODESRIA) is delighted to welcome all participants in the 2nd annual Globalisation Studies Network (GSN) conference to Dakar and we hope you will enjoy your stay in Senegal. In order to ensure that the conference is as stimulating and enjoyable as possible for all participants, we invite you to observe the following guidelines as they apply to you personally and/or to the panels in which you will be participating:

Venue for Conference Sessions: All of the sessions of the 2nd Annual GSN conference will take place at the Novotel Hotel in Dakar where most of the delegates are also accommodated.

Structure of the Programme: The conference will be run on the basis of a combination of plenary and parallel sessions. Each parallel session features three simultaneous panels.

General Time Management: Each day, the conference will open at 09.00hrs and continue until 19.00 hours. All participants are invited to be punctual so that the conference does not lose time unnecessarily before sessions get underway. Each session is expected to run for about two hours. The sizes of panels have been kept deliberately small in order to allow ample time for discussion and debate.

Interpretation Services: Equipment to facilitate simultaneous translation in English and French will be available during all sessions of the conference.

Conference Equipment: The Conference Secretariat will be at your disposal to arrange facilities which you may require for slide shows, power point presentations, etc.

Tea/Coffee Breaks: Tea and coffee, as well as fruit juices and snacks will be served in the courtyard of Novotel Hotel during the breaks built into the daily programme. Thirty minutes have been allotted for each break and two breaks will be observed daily.

Lunch Breaks: Buffet lunch will be served during the three days of the conference at Novotel Hotel. The time allotted for each lunch break is one hour. Participants with special dietary needs will be catered for by arrangement with Novotel Hotel.

Chairs: Each session has a designated chair who has been requested to manage the time allotted in such a manner that at least one hour is available for questions and debate. Effectively, it means that no speaker will have more than **15 minutes** to present their arguments.

Paper Presenters: The principle underpinning the design of the programme is that paper presenters want to be able to share their ideas and then get a full feedback from their audience. For this reason, all paper presenters are urged to observe a limit of **15 minutes** for their presentation. Chairs of sessions are requested to enforce this time limit to ensure that sufficient time is allowed for discussions. At the end of the discussions, each paper presenter will be allowed five minutes to offer closing reflections before the session is wrapped up.

Keynote Speakers: The 2nd Annual GSN Conference will feature two special guests who will be delivering keynote addresses. They are Abdulai Janneh of the UNDP and Samir Amin of

the TWF. They will have up to 45 minutes for their presentations and have also agreed to entertain questions arising from their speeches.
